## CHANGES TO LOG CONSTITUTION

Sport England have a programme aimed at improving all sports clubs, in particular to promote well run clubs that are safe and positive environments for young people. Clubmark is the British Orienteering version of this. This will help us become a better club for all of us with improved coaching, openness and duty of care, and especially for our junior members. From an operating stand point our constitution is rather old, and in some ways doesn't reflect the clubs current set up. Also the new constitution makes us more attractive to the bodies that give out grants. Expect to see a series of policies backing this up being adopted over the coming months.

Anyway enough mucking around. Please read the new constitution, delivered with this LOG-NEWS. There will be an EGM at the Victoria, Lincoln on 14 December starting at 7:30pm. We must have 25% of the membership present to make this important step forward, please support it.

**3. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT – Some very personal reflections from "Ian D";**

It was my intention to stand down last year but was persuaded by Steve Bones that he would do Vice Chair if I continued as Chairman. Seeing all the effort and hard work that Steve has put in over the last 12 months it was a good decision to stay on as Chairman, even if my own input has been lacking.

It has been a good year for the club with regard to orienteering. The summer league was extremely successful due to good organisation, good planning good publicity and the continued support by members. I was going to congratulate all the LIMP winners at this stage but I found as I typed this at 6.15 this evening I could not open the file! Anyway, they know who they are and I do congratulate them, with the increase in numbers it makes winning that much more satisfying.

The first Bomber went well, if a little over budget, but we learn by our mistakes and next year's event is already looking very promising and rather unique. With the right publicity I think it can be bigger than we imagine. Our colour coded events were successful as they always have been again thanks to good planning, organisation and the volunteer force. Hopefully there will be even more members eager to plan an event this coming year, both regional and summer series. Membership across the region is dropping but LOG maintains a constant level. In theory it could be a lot bigger than it is but we are financially sound so we can afford to put some effort into attracting more members.

On a personal note, I do feel guilty about taking the position of Chair and then not doing it justice by taking on a fair level of the work. However, I think I have done Chairman, on and off, for a total of some 12+ years so it is time for a change. For those new to the club, who see little of me as Chairman I can perhaps defend myself

for my lack of effort by saying I have worked hard in the past having started LOG in 1987 simply to get some grant money to set up a permanent course on the South Common to train army cadets for whom I was the County Orienteering Officer. Grants can only be given to properly constituted clubs, and rightly so.

The club started, I got the grant, set up the permanent course and within two years my cadets were UK ACF Champions. Mission accomplished but the club did not go away. I believe Martin Wheeler attended the first meeting and was a steady guiding influence. I think we are now the only founder members left, not forgetting Gillian of course.

Since then most if not all the equipment the club has, has been obtained through grants I have obtained for the club. For the first ten years I organised every event and kept all the equipment at home and maintained it. I took it to every event single event then took it home again. Karl eventually took over those tasks ably assisted by Richard. Perhaps that is not the best way to deal with on going tasks because volunteer fatigue sets in and, in my case, having not orienteered for some three years, apart from one compass cup, I feel I no longer want the effort on others behalf so I intend to stand down from Chairman and possible not rejoin either BOF or LOG next year. I may change my mind of course.

Having said that most people have my phone number or email address, and it will probably be nice to do something because I want to, and not because I feel obliged to, so I will still be available should I be required.

I thank all committee members who have worked hard this last year and supported the club and, by doing so, supported me. I would also thank members for their continued support which makes LOG, small, but beautifully put together, an excellent club to belong to. I wish the club the best of everything for the new season and look forward to the occasional phone call or email.

# THE OCTOBER ODYSSEY

## 30<sup>th</sup> Sept - 1<sup>st</sup> Oct

An event of two very different halves. Andy and I drove to Whitby on the Friday afternoon to stay in a B&B, whilst Dave Denness drove up later on Friday and camped just outside Robin Hoods Bay.

Saturday morning dawned sunny and we set off for Sneaton Forest, a wooded area south of Whitby. This was a working wood and large areas had recently been clear felled. However, in the main the planner had managed to keep us away from the worst areas and had set challenging courses. We all managed to finish on day 1 but we were all towards the slowest for our age groups.

For me Saturday night was the highlight...we all went whale watching. Andy and I had gone down to the harbour early on Saturday morning to book places on a 2 hour boat trip. The boat left the harbour at 5.45pm on a fairly calm autumn evening, about 20 minutes later we saw our first Minke whale. We spent the next hour or so watching Minkes surfacing, the nearest was only about 20 feet from the boat. They were feeding on a shoal of herring. What a way to watch the sunset!

Sunday morning promised rain, and we were running on Fylingdales Moor, which was a mixture of wood, open high moor, steep sided bracken covered valleys and boggy low moor. Personally I had a better run, but the terrain was testing. Andy found the terrain too much and had to retire – for some reason he just can't get on with heather. Luckily we had all finished before the rain came and adjourned to the local pub for lunch, unfortunately the choice was beef or lamb, and neither Andy nor I eat meat. How very short sighted of the pub, because they lost three customers that day. As we drove away from the pub the rain started in earnest.

As with a number of two day events your times are added together and your final position is calculated from your total time. Personally I like the October Odyssey for a couple of reasons. ## OXFORD CITY RACE 4<sup>th</sup> November, 2006

Having tried the York City Race back in May, this was a final opportunity to sample this new and exciting form of orienteering before our own Historic Lincoln Race, in January. It was a glorious sunny day, a little cold at first, but it soon warmed and the autumn colours were stunning. Hopefully by the time you read this there will be maps and photos on the website, but the front cover of the newsletter shows part of the highly detailed map. The fast and furious nature of the racing meant no time to stop and ponder route choice, and so mistakes could easily happen. Kaele and John managed to run using each other's EMIT cards and so were initially disqualified despite good runs. These new cards are "contact free" and only need to pass within a metre of the control, although most did at least touch the kite to be sure. Is this the future of orienteering? Possibly. Is it proper orienteering? Yes of course it is, complex navigation at speed, what more do you want! An excellent day all round.

## NEW LOG MEMBERSHIP STRUCTURE FOR 2007

At the recent AGM a proposal was passed that the club will adopt a new, two tier, membership structure from 2007. This will align us with the new 'Local' and 'National' membership scheme that British Orienteering are implementing. It will mean that from 2007 all active club members will be either Local or National British Orienteering Members. As a result all active LOG members will benefit from British Orienteering insurance and be eligible to take part in the JK, national, regional, district and local events. They will get discounted entry to regional and district events within the East Midlands Region and a biannual British Orienteering newsletter. Those who opt for the extra benefits of British Orienteering 'National' membership will get discounted entry to the JK, national events and regional and district events in all regions as well the quarterly British Orienteering magazine "Focus".

It was a very eventful inaugural OMM, which followed the old KIMM tradition of visiting Galloway when the year ends in a “6”! It also followed the old KIMM tradition of “interesting” Galloway weather. A much fuller review of the event, plus photos, can be

Galloway is a spectacular area in South-west Scotland, which sadly is too often ignored by the hoards heading further north for the highlands. It is the home of “The Wicker Man” and many other ancient and strange traditions. A quick glance at a map will soon find such delights as “The Range of the Awful Hand”, “Murder Hole”, Bog of Gairy”, Rigg of The Jarkness” and “The Devil’s Bowling Green”. But Galloway is also “Tussock Central”, the most inhospitable terrain to walk on, let alone run, in the whole of Britain. It had also rained for a week and was completely waterlogged underfoot. In Galloway you don’t just find bogs on flat ground!

Day 1 was mild, but very very wet, with cloud right down to the campsite and assembly area. It was barely daylight before the teams were off. The long-score class saw 2 LOG teams, with Steve and Liam running considerably further than Tim and John, but only outscoring them by 30 points. They missed a high scoring control in the fog, then put time pressure on themselves for later. Dave and Andy had swapped to the B course for 2006, and had another excellent result up there with the top teams. This was the toughest day’s navigation on a KIMM/OMM for several years, with many teams retiring or being disqualified after failing to find controls. Our own Paul and Colm on the A course were among these, but so was explorer extraordinaire Ranulf Fiennes so they were in good company!

The mid-camp was quite pleasant once the rain had stopped, and we awoke to a nice sunrise and clear skies. Dave and Andy had another great day and ended in fine style with another top 25 finish. Steve and Liam had a good day too, and in clear visibility extended their lead over Tim and John, although the latter did stop to take photos and had injury problems! Apparently this was the first time the sun had ever shone on a Galloway KIMM/OMM, so you had to make the most of the opportunity!

Despite the difficulties everyone wants to do the OMM in 2007, it gets into your blood like that and is very difficult to resist.

[www.youtube.com](http://www.youtube.com) is a useful place where people can post short videos on any subject. There are an increasing number of orienteering ones there now, some very silly and entertaining, others quite spectacular, but you might have to trawl through some rubbish to find them.

French multiple World Champion Thierry Georgiou has produced several “follow me” videos, showing him running through stunning areas linked to the map. These are also linked from the Maprunner website and are highly recommended. We particularly like the run round the old Italian town of Cervera which shows how complex this style of orienteering can be. His site also has links to individual websites for all the worlds top orienteers

If you check out the videos at the American “waterstop” site, also linked from Maprunner, then be sure to check “Crazy Choice” first, it is awesome!

On a more serious note [www.OCAD.com](http://www.OCAD.com) is the place to go for updates and tutorials on the OCAD mapping software, now up to OCAD9, although most LOG maps and courses are still produced on OCAD8.

## THE WHITE ROSE WEEKEND

The White Rose is a multi-day event held over the August Bank Holiday weekend somewhere on the North York Moors. The format is 2 individual days followed by a team event on the Monday. The aim is to provide a relaxed and friendly event for all members of the family.

The event moves around each year, and the starts and finishes are within walking distance of the assembly area and campsite. Beware this event is not camping for the faint hearted, the facilities are basic. I affectionately refer to it as “my dirty weekend away”, as there are no shower facilities!
