Still only £1 per run, 3 courses on offer every night, the best 5 runs count towards your final points score, trophies for the winners of each course over the Series.

SHORT – 2-3km in length, easy to medium difficulty, similar to an “orange” course, suitable for beginners, mainly on paths.

LONG – 5-6km in length, medium difficulty, similar to a “red” course, suitable for runners or orienteers looking to give their brains a bit of a rest!

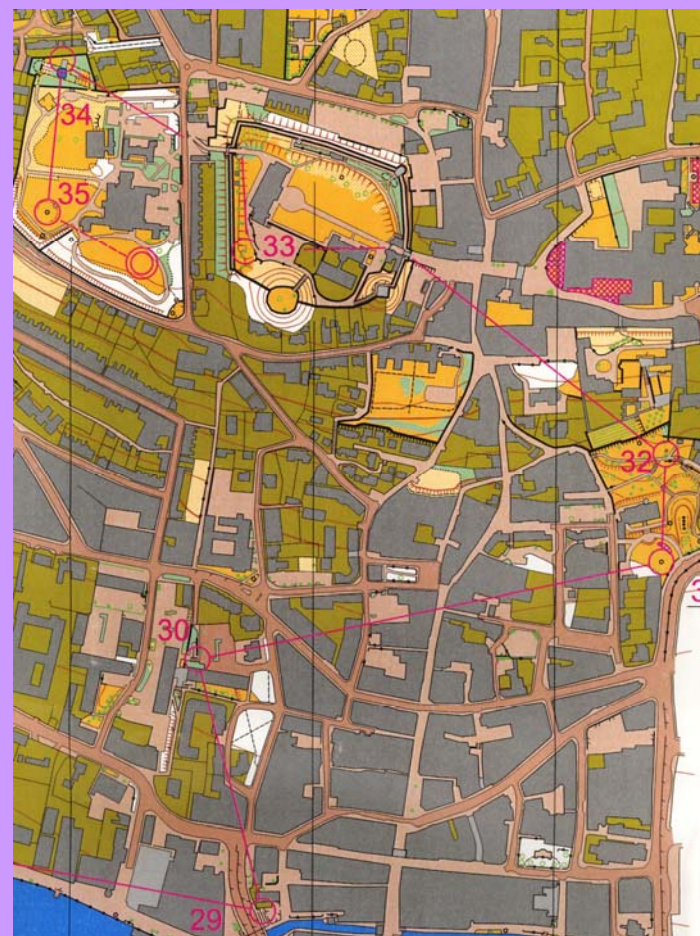
TECHNICAL – 4-5km in length, difficult, suitable for experienced orienteers. This course could be similar to a “green”, but it could also be almost anything else, including map memory, score, “Norwegian”, corridors/windows etc!

Each event should be ready to start by 6.30pm, hopefully a bit earlier, and the last start will be dependent on what time it gets dark. Aim to get there earlier for the first few events as these will be most affected by approaching darkness. Remember that the organiser has to put the kites out, and help collecting them in at the end will be most appreciated. As numbers increase the organisers will also appreciate help from experienced members in running the start/finish, and guiding any beginners.

COMPASS-SPORT CUP

Most of you will know that we have had to cancel the event at Stapleford Woods on March 18th. This was due to the storms we had at the end of January. Many woods in the region were damaged, but Stapleford was affected more than most with over 20,000 trees being blown flat, thousands of others left hanging in precarious positions and the road through the wood being blocked for 250 metres.

Clear felling last Autumn left several blocks of conifers open to the prevailing westerly winds for the first time in their lives, so the next big storm took it's toll and flattened them. We tried to re-map the woods in time for the CSC, but it soon became clear that the Forestry Commission had so much damage to clear up in the region that they couldn't even guarantee that the tracks would be clear for March. The hanging trees are also very dangerous, and the event controller called it off in early February.

The competition will still go ahead on the same date, but attempts to hold the match somewhere else in the region also failed. So now we are going to Greno Woods just north of Sheffield. It is quite a technical wood, and also steep in places, probably more of a challenge than the original venue.

Sean Harrington is LOG team captain and will be ringing round to sort the team out, but the story remains the same, we need every member we can muster, especially away from our home ground. You should have had March 18th in your diaries for months, it is just that the venue has changed. As I type we are struggling to put a full team together, so please contact Sean a.s.a.p. especially if you are a junior or elderly member. You all know the situation by now, too many M40-50s, not enough of anyone else.

SURFING THE WEB

Here is another very interesting website for orienteers www.old-maps.co.uk especially if you are into old maps and want to compare an area now with how it looked in the past. Some orienteering forests have changed a lot over the years, but others have remained very similar for centuries. There is also an aerial photo feature that is quite good too.

If you are interested in orienteering around the world then www.worldfofo.com could be the only website you need. With an extensive calendar of world events, and a register of maps from around the world, you could spend days just exploring the website. Perfect for the orienteering anorak in your family!

IMPROVE YOUR “O”

In LOG's 20th anniversary year it is interesting to reflect on the changes our sport has seen over that time. Electronic punching is perhaps the biggest advance, with OCAD making mapping accessible to almost anyone a close second? The future is likely to see an increased use of GPS technology, although it is currently not permitted to use a GPS receiver during an event. However, many people do carry them round with them now, if only to download their route onto a computer when they get home so they can analyse their run.

Several elite events have already experimented with GPS transmitters attached to competitors, so their progress can be followed on a giant screen in assembly, or in real time on a PC at home. This takes the observer right there into the forest, and could be the key to making orienteering a more attractive sport to the masses.

But going back to analysing your run, how long will it be before we all have a GPS transmitter, possibly integrated into our SI dibbers, so we can all plot our routes onto a PC straight after the race? It might be a rude awakening for some of us, showing how far wrong we actually went on that dodgy leg, or showing the world our headless chicken searches for the control in the wrong block of forest!

We are part way to this now with the excellent Route Gadget software being used by more and more clubs as part of their result packages. Most of us are used to analysing Winsplits data now, comparing separate leg times and looking for sudden changes in the slope of the graph of our runs. Route Gadget takes this one step further, giving us the tool to plot our route onto the course map as well as giving us splits and graphs. This assumes we know where we were the whole time out on the course, but until GPS tracking is widespread it's the best we have. Just try to be honest!

HALO recently used Route Gadget for their Scardale and Knapton event, and it was an eye opener as well as being highly entertaining! You not only plot your route, but you can also compare it with everyone else who has plotted theirs, and then play a virtual race animation with coloured dots chasing around the forest representing each competitor. See where you lost it, or gained places. Compare route choice, discover some bizarrely poor (hysterical!) route choices, or even discover a brilliant route you never thought possible.

This really is a fantastic tool to graphically show your strengths and weaknesses, and to indicate areas of technique to work on. Keep an eye on the results pages at events, and if Route Gadget is available make full use of it, you won't regret it.

EYAM MOOR 21.1.07

This was the second time Liam and I had been to Eyam Moor, the last time being in 2003 when we both competed on the green course. The weather seemed OK in the morning before we set off, but by the time we got to Eyam the snow had started. I had a quick check with the locals who confirmed I would not get snowed in while out on the course.

For people who have not been to Eyam the area is pure hell, no paths, no trees just open moorland where everything looks the same, due to this I chose the Blue whilst Liam went for the Brown.

I had a reasonable start picking up the first 6 controls without any major problem, having to walk most of the way due to the conditions underfoot (grim), controls 7-9 were a bit more technical but a few of us had grouped up which helped. Unfortunately due to this on the way to control 10 I was not concentrating, when I eventually found the next control it was my 13, it was then I realised the group I had latched on to were not actually on my course!

Therefore I headed back to control 10, then 11 and 12 without too much problem, then back again to 13, no surprises for people who know me even though I had been there 15 minutes earlier I still had trouble finding it. A few problems from 14 to 18, but nothing major, and then a quick dart to the finish.

I noticed when the results came out that quite a few people missed out on Control 17, this was a compulsory crossing. I must admit it nearly fooled me, but after the Bomber incident I made sure I punched it.*

Joking apart the area is great and certainly takes orienteering to a different level.

** The Bomber incident that Sean refers to was when he was disqualified from the long-O for not punching at the map exchange. Clearly he went to the control or he wouldn't have been able to complete the course, and I think the "popular" view is that he should have been reinstated. It is a common mistake though, and used to happen all the time at second master map controls before e-punching. When you get to something like a second master map or map exchange it is easy to forget to punch the control as well. Another very experienced orienteer nearly did the same thing at a compulsory rail crossing on the long-O, and only a generous course marshall calling him back saved him from the same embarrassing fate! Ed.*

SCARDALE AND KNAPTON 18.2.07

This regional event just south of the Malton to Scarborough Road was also the official HALO 25th anniversary event, so a small group of us felt obliged to attend, and very glad we were too. Scardale and Knapton is possibly HALO's premier area, situated right on the northern edge of the Yorkshire Wolds and made up of 2 separate woods.

The start/finish and car park was at a caravan park with extensive views north across the Vale of Pickering. It could have been very bleak in February, but in the sunshine it was glorious. The start was in Scardale Wood, which slopes steeply to the south and is mainly runnable, but with slightly more bramble than the last time we were there. After a loop it was a taped route across the fields and into Knapton Wood, smaller but on a steep north facing slope. This section was superb, extremely runnable despite the steepness, and the final few controls were in spur and re-entrant terrain reminiscent of a big Scottish forest. The final climb to the finish wasn't as bad as it could have been, but still left most people on their knees gasping for breath.

HALO incorporated Route Gadget into the results, and this is discussed elsewhere. Another significant point was that the longest course (M21L) was won by a woman!

Well done to HALO, and best wishes for the next 25 years.

AERIAL PHOTOGRAPHY

KENILWORTH NIGHT STREET-O

The other night I ran a night street O in Kenilworth. It was great fun. I happened to look on Nope Sport and someone had posted a message advertising it. Kenilworth is literally 5 minutes away from where I am working in Coventry so I thought it would be wrong to not go.

The race started and finished at someones house just off the high street. There were 2 courses on offer, a long and a short with 14 controls on the long at 6.6K. The short course used the same course and map, but you just had to jump from control 6 to 12 and it was 4.5k.

Controls were the control sign printed on A4 paper with a letter printed over the top. These were then taped to lamp posts or telegraph poles. These are a lot less likely to be nicked than kites, yet the last control still managed to be spirited away. Maps were water proof, and had control descriptions and boxes to write in the control letters on the back. Entry cost was £3. It was very simply run, and there weren't that many entries, people possibly put off by the weather which was freezing hard after rain. But it was great fun. It would have been a lot easier had I taken a torch with me!

Reading the map had to be done under street lights which of course really slowed me down, and crossing a dark park without a light was dodgy to say the least. A great idea maybe we should try one. £3 was a bit steep, but I got an hours entertainment for it so I'm not complaining.

The map was a traditional O map, produced on Ocad, printed by Kall Kwik 1:15,000 scale. The whole of the town fitted on A4. To be honest it didn't need to be more detailed. It had all the link paths and cut throughs marked clear enough, and control points were fairly obvious junctions etc. yet route choice was very tricky at times, particularly as I couldn't see the map very well. Sodium street lights illuminate the map with a nice orange glow that makes some of the detail very tricky to read. Looking at the map in day light I missed a lot of cut throughs that I could have made and ran quite a lot further than I needed.
